REAL PROGRESS ON LOCAL ISSUES

• Launching the inaugural Norfolk Enterprise festival

- Norfolk is home to thousands of small local businesses. For too long this community has been hidden away in bedrooms, industrial estates and old farm buildings, with insufficient voice in our national and local government.
- The people who 'have a go' and start a new venture whether business or community project are the heroes of our County.
- That's why I co-founded the first NorfolkWay Enterprise Festival at Westacre Theatre in September. Approximately 500 people attended on a chilly and wet afternoon but that did not stop the enthusiasm – and the event will be taking place again in 2019. (See More Here)

Standing up for Norfolk villages facing a massive Power Station development

- National Infrastructure Projects are vital for our local economy, jobs, and the provisions available.
- However, if these are to be implemented, they require sufficient amounts of infrastructure to support them and local people affected, have the right to be consulted.
- That is why I have led the campaign with Necton and five surrounding villages, to fight for a proper location and proper local compensation. (See More Here)

Fighting for a new approach to planning

- Large companies continue to exploit the loopholes in our planning law.
- Yes, we need housing, but NOT at any cost and not without infrastructure.
- Mid Norfolk villages deserve a voice. That's why I have been working with the Minister of State for Housing, District Councils, and Parish Councils, across my patch to secure vital reforms to the planning system and ensure our towns and villages are always fairly treated and respected. • Supporting dedicated public servants on the front line – Norfolk Ambulance service

- Our frontline Ambulance Staff face significant challenges all year round. But especially in winter.
- The local Ambulance Trust has had some difficult management issues locally.
- That's why I went to experience first-hand, and support great men and women on the frontline for us, 24:7. Thank you for all you do for us! (See More Here)

• Providing full access for Wymondham rail station

- For far too long Norfolk has seen its transport infrastructure neglected. I'm proud to have helped secure the £300m for the A47 and £500m for the A11 and new trains.But our rail stations matter too. It is unacceptable in this day and age for ANY railway station to have an inaccessible platform.
- That's why I continue to lead the campaign to improve access to Platform 2 of Wymondham Station.
- By working with Network Rail, Abellio Greater Anglia, South Norfolk Council officers and local councillors, initial designs for a ramp and drop-off point have been produced, and I look forward to continuing my work with these parties raise the funds required to get the job done. <u>(See More</u>)







Delivering for Dereham Bowls Club

- Our market towns and villages are the backbone of our rural way of life, and the various clubs and societies within them play a vital part in fostering the great sense of community.
- That's why I was concerned to learn, last year, that St Nicholas' Bowls Club, right in the centre of Dereham, was facing an uncertain future – with its lease coming up for renewal with Breckland.
- I was pleased to work with the Chairman of the Bowls Club, Raymond Worby, and his team to encourage Breckland to give them the certainty they needed – and I am delighted that the Club have now signed a new lease which gives them exactly that.
- The Club has one of the best greens around, as well as a thriving membership and ambitions to improve even further. Go along and have a go. It's fun for **all** the family! <u>(See More Here).</u>

• Supporting Town and Village Plans

- With pressure from big national housing developers, it's crucial that communities develop their own Neighbourhood Plans – to give them greater protection from aggressive out-of-town developers.
- That's why I have been working so closely with Attleborough, Watton and Dereham councils to support Partnerships that will oversee their Town Plans and bring the wider community together to deliver local priority infrastructure and projects.
- I'm also continuing to fight in Westminster for local planning reforms. <u>(See More Here)</u>
- In early December, I convened a meeting with the Housing and Planning Minister, Breckland Council, and the Chairman and Clerk of Swanton Morley Parish Council, to push for key reforms. (See More Here)

UK health ministers shared the news of an upcoming funding boost to brain tumour research, during a visit to laboratories at Queen Mary University of London this week.

- So many people in our society still suffer in silence from mental illness, which knows no boundaries and is no respecter of class, political affiliation or geography.
- I have seen and experienced it first hand in my own family: my own father died aged 62 when I was 20, after a traumatic life collapse from bankruptcy, alcoholism and mental illness. That is why I helped lead in Parliament, along with; Stella Creasy (LAB), Norman Lamb (Lib Dem), and Johnny Mercer (CON), the "Breathing Space" campaign and Bill. (See More Here)

A fortnight ago this column included an item about the auction of the owner's gold trophy for the 1958 Grand National, won by the Arthur Freeman ridden Mr What, which had been saved from the melting pot.

This year's Grand National is special for Norfolk MP George Freeman.

• Delivering an orderly Brexit to minimise disruption & maximise opportunity for the many not the few

Whilst I voted to Remain in 2016 because I thought that Brexit would damage our economy and make my constituents poorer, I totally respect the Referendum result and am committed to finding a sensible Withdrawal deal. I do not support a 2nd Referendum which I believe would deepen divisions and disillusionment.

We need a Withdrawal Agreement. It would be seriously unwise to crash-out without a Withdrawal Agreement, which all the evidence shows could lead to serious disruption to the economy and public services like the NHS.

The last two and a half years since the Brexit Referendum has not been a good advertisement for UK politics. We have seen the nation hugely divided over Brexit, the Government and now Parliament bogged down in negotiations. With under 100 days to go and both the EU and PM playing hardball we are in dangerous times.

This is a time for statesmanlike calm. I would prefer to see a cross-party approach to Brexit: there are many Labour, Lib Dem and MPs from Scotland Wales and N Ireland who support Brexit and I think it would be better to have a cross-party Brexit that worked for the majority, not just the few. We need to deliver for as many of the 48% and the 52% as we can.

Above all we need to find a way to stop the deepening divisions, find a new and lasting relationship with Europe, ("in the Common Market but not in the political union" as the majority of my constituents wanted) and get back to the urgent domestic policy priorities and grievances of UK citizens.

I continue to speak out for that - on behalf of ALL my constituents. Not just the ones who voted for Brexit. My job is to represent the interests of ALL constituents. Of all parties and persuasions and none. Which I am determined to continue to do. <u>(See</u> <u>More Here).</u>
